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

The Spot Bailey's Taproom, a "beer bar" with rotating local taps

The Lines Buses 1, 12, 20, 54 and 56; Green and Yellow MAX

The Skinny Bailey's is a bright, clean triangle of a space at SW Broadway and Ankeny. With a mix of comfortable chairs and regular tables, under-counter and postmounted hooks for jackets and purses, board games on shelves by the door and water on the counter, it's welcoming to the last detail. Bottles adorn the windows, light fixtures, shelves and cabinet, and the layout includes a small table almost hidden in the back, perfect for a quiet drink for two. Tall windows look out on the busy street.

Michael, the bartender, was friendly and service was prompt. I tried out two beers,

Boneyard's Girl Beer and Oakshire's Kilted Badger, and enjoyed both tremendously, especially the Kilted Badger with its complex layers of flavor. All the taps at Bailey's rotate regularly, so you'll rarely find the same beer twice.

Not only is Bailey's in the heart of downtown, it has just added its own TriMet arrivals board, a Transit

Appliance installed by Portland Transport, so you can see when your next bus is without even leaving the bar. The

inconspicuous screen near the cash register displays departures for the many nearby

> stops, ordered by time (it can be a bit hard to find the line you need). Bartender and patrons alike said it's heavily used.

With Bailey's friendly atmosphere, excellent beer, and easy transit access, if I were going to hang out in a bar, this would be the one.
