I'm 17. I meet people every day on the bus. I really talk to a lot of people. I'm meeting 10, 15, 20 new people a day. You can get somebody's life story in 10 minutes.

I've always been around white people, because I'm on swim team. So I had to get a feel for them.

So I was leaving swim practice. I'm leaving from Lake Oswego High School. I see this guy in the back with a broke arm. I was like: Man! Conversation opener right there.

I'm like, "How did your arm break?" "I got into a fight," he says. I was like, "Tell me."

He's purchasing some things, and apparently his wallet was on top of the counter. This guy he knew - he'd just given him 20 bucks! - takes the guy's wallet off the countertop. It turns into a scuffle.

The thing going through my head is: Damn, did he win or lose? His arm's messed

Then he said, "I was a state champion in wrestling." Aw, man!

He told me he punched the guy about 16 times in a row. He gets the wallet back, and his arm is like drenched in blood, because he beat the guy up so bad.

Stories like that get my day going. We talked the whole bus ride. He grew up a

country boy, went to jail. Has a nice little girlfriend.

You really can't trust anybody. Because we all want money. That's why I'm on my go to be

the richest man in the world. I'm pretty much on my way now.

Street Talk Five questions and someone worth asking ------

Six years after moving to PDX, Marc Moscato decided to put himself on a mission: leading bus, bike and foot tours that peel back corners of Portland's history before they're papered over by - well, by him and his fellow white boys. We met on his downtown roof to talk about our city of immigrants and his thing for hobos in 1930s Chicago.

Your Dill Pickle Club does tours, books, events. What's the thread? It's a group of people interested in learning more about their city. In part it's self-serving. How do I make sense of Portland? I wanted to form a group of people to figure out. How'd you get into it? I was thinking a lot about how art happens in a recession. I started reading about hobo culture - this radical nightclub in a barn called the Dill

Pickle Club. They had jazz concerts and put on oneact plays and this "soapbox forum" every Sunday night. So I was like, we should restart the club, 80 years later. Educational space that's not school – that's really needed in Portland. Everywhere, really.

Why do you do your events on-site?

In Portland, there's not a deep connection with place or history. Growing up in Buffalo, there were these huge ruins downtown, like the Roman forum. You had no choice but to acknowledge there was something here before, an industrial culture.

Who are the hobos of 2010?


Hobos were really part of the working class. Now the counterculture is kind of a refuting of workingclass culture: punk, zine, independent hip-hop, even freelance designers. Anyone who isn't tied down.

What's your favorite Portland secret?

Mmm. Okay: A little restaurant in the bottom of a church on Interstate, where they have the Polish Festival every year, called Grandpa's Cafe. Only open around services. Good pierogis and potato pancakes. P

auto when you get to a new place? Solution: Move by bike Almost every weekend in Portland, a group of bikers shows up at someone's house to load their stuff onto bike trailers and move it. All they ask for is breakfast first, lunch afterward and your help on a few other people's moves. Details at pdx.be/MoveByBike • Problem: Insurance When car owners get in bike crashes, their insurance covers them. What if you don't own a car? Solution: Buy a car you won't drive Local bike lawyer Ray Thomas suggested this on BikePortland: buy a junk car for a few hundred bucks; let it sit, insured, in the driveway; and bike your heart out. • Problem: Employment You always wanted to be a bike messenger. Solution: Move to New York "There aren't any bike messenger jobs to get," said Dee Branham of Magpie Messenger Collective. "I have a folder in my email that just contains several hundred requests. You could do what we did, which is start your own company. Becoming your traditional quicksilver messenger on a fixie is Old hat? Maybe nothing here is news to you. Maybe biking's not your thing. This is because it takes 3 to 5 hours, at \$45 an hour for a trained mechanic with space and tools, to fully refurbish an old bike. Solution: A la carte repairs The Community Cycling Center (NE 17th and Alberta) sells dirtcheap unrefurbished bikes, lets you work on them for free with their tools, and lets you hire their mechanics for whichever repairs intimidate you. • Problem: Moving day How can you do without an know someone who could use this guide someday.
